## Ways we gratefully received your support.

The Bob and Dee Leggett Foundation provided two grants:

- 1) A grant for Kutenda Children's Home to purchase and install 3 lithium batteries for power storage with the solar power system providing water pumping and water tank storage. Additional solar panels and a new 10,000-gallon water holding tank have been installed.
- 2) A grant to the Rural Empowerment Campaign in Action (RECA) Harare, Zimbabwe nonprofit. Founder and Director Mr. Fungayi Musara. The grant provided drilling of a rural well bore and solar powered clean water access to the Zhombwe Primary School, teachers' homes and the community. The community can now plant gardens. 16 suitcases of goods and clothing for Kutenda children and caregivers were flown with Bonnie Dixon. Hosted by Co-Directors, Anna Maponga, and son, Prosper, the summer was filled with projects.

- Repairing trucks, purchase of tires and maintenance equipment
- Building a Pig House providing a self-sustaining resource for food and pig sales
- Purchase of 200 laying hens, 3 cattle, 2 goats and 1 ton of maize for meals.
- Repairing doors, floors, leaking roofs and fence.
- Purchase of linens, medications, dental appointments

### **Prosper was selected to be Secretary General of Mashonaland Central Children's Homes**

Prosper works closely with the government in oversight of the province's 7 children's homes. He has attended government sponsored workshops in conservation farming methods. Participating in this training garners inputs of seeds and fertilizer from the government for this planting season.

Kutenda has 2 Care-Mothers and a University of Bindura social work Intern assisting at Kutenda where 22 children currently reside. This number often swells to the capacity of 24 children.

\$4,500.00 is sent every 2 months as JourneyPartners commits to help with sustainability for Kutenda through your generous support. These funds are used for food purchases, medical needs, educational fees and uniforms, and staff compensation.
